The American Museum of Natural History announces that the "Butterflies of the American Tropics, the genus Anaea" (Lepidoptera, Nymphalidae), by the late William Phillips Comstock, is now available for mailing.

The book completely covers the large and beautiful genus Anaea, with practically every species and subspecies being illustrated. In addition to the taxonomic section, there is a wealth of information and ideas of the greatest importance to the study of animal classification and distribution, and of the New World tropical fauna in general. This book, in addition to the basic subject matter, is noteworthy because of its superb beauty of illustration and excellence of design, and it is destined to have the strongest appeal to bibliophiles the world over, as well as to everyone genuinely interested in natural history.

This magnificent book of xvi + 276 pages includes 19 pages of black and white drawings and 30 full pages of color plates, some of these being printed in nine colors. Dr. W.J. Reinthal, Knoxville, Tenn., is presently engaged in the following

entomological research:

1. Continuing the revisional study of <u>Asterocampa</u>, with the main emphasis in 1961, on making observations and collecting material in the Southeast (Tenn., Ala., Miss., La., Fla., Ga., S.C., N.C.), breeding several species <u>ex ova</u> and describing their early stages. A grant has been awarded to him by the American Philosophical Society to assist with the above research.

2. Working over all available material and distribution data on butterflies of Oklahoma and preparing an annotated list to be published in 1962 with Mr. Clarence McCoy, University of Colorado, as junior co-author.

3. A systematic study of the butterfly fauna of the Great Smoky Mts. National Park has been initiated. The Park collection is being revised and all available distribution data are being assembled; additional material is being collected in the Park area.

The attention of the members is called to the existence of the Society Library, which is in the care of Dr. Peter Bellinger, Dept. of Natural Sciences, San Fernando Valley State College, Northridge, Calif., U.S.A. Members may borrow issues of periodicals and other publications by writing to the Librarian at the above address. Material on loan should be returned as promptly as possible. Members living in the United States are asked to include stamps to match the mailing costs.

Members are urged to enhance the permanent value of the Library by sending copies of their publications to the Librarian. This will also insure the appearance of abstracts in the Recent Literature section of the JOURNAL. Donations of other publications will be gratefully received also. At present the bulk of the Library consists of serials received in exchange for the JOURNAL. The list of these serials will be given in succeeding numbers of the <u>NEWS</u>.
