A reminder that the Annual Meeting of the Society will be held jointly with the Pacific Stope Meeting in Santa Barbara, Calif., on Labor Day week end, 1962. The Annual Meeting for 1963 will be held in Texas, details to be announced as the plans develop.

Word has been received of the death of William M. Davidson, former USDA Entomologist and Secretary of the Florida Audubon Society, in Orlando, Florida, aged seventy-four. An obituary will follow in the JOURNAL.

Dr. Max Cretschmar, of Celle, Hannover, Germany, dies December 12, 1961, aged sixty-one He was an outstanding student of German Lepidoptera and Associate Editor of the Zeitschrift für Lepidopterologie. He owned a large and valuable collection of palaearctic Lepidoptera and had been a member of the Lepidopterists' Society for some years.

From Switzerland comes the report of the death of Jakob Burk, aged sixty-three years, in Birsfelden, and of Hans Müller-Stüssi, aged forty-six years, in Allschwill.

The Entomological Society of Basel held its International Exchange Day on November 10, 1961. Among the material offered on the bourse were insect artwork, insects and other animals embedded in plastic, and gilded insects.

The Frankfort Insect Course was held on the 4-5 November, 1961, under the auspices of Apollo Entomological Society and the International Entomological Society. In connection with this event, Dr. Fr. Gross presented an illustrated lecture entitled "The development of the nymphalid fauna of the Euro-Asiatic Continent".

The Düsseldorf Insect Bourse was held on the 22nd of November, 1961, in the Löbbecke Museum. K. Stamm presented an illustrated lecture on the theme "Around the border of the Sahara". On November 12, 1961, the Natural History Society of Fürth held its Insect Bourse, at which Dr. K. Gauckler spoke on "The habitats of the flora and fauna of the Alpine Forelands".

## Treasurer's Comments

- I. Whereas expenses again exceeded income, the amount is the smallest of the last four years. This approach to balanced operations has resulted from the increase in dues and subscription rates instituted in 1960 and 1961.
- 2. Despite the above balance in 1961 operations, a substantial deficit has persisted since the years of spiralling publishing costs and relatively low, fixed income (especially 1958 and 1959). Thus, assets have not grown sufficiently to meet the accelerated publishing schedule required to restore the <u>Journal</u> schedule in 1962. Unless income improves in 1962 from such sources as Back Numbers, Illustrations Fund, etc., a substantial part of current expenses will continue to be borne by future income.
- 3. The following is the proposed budget for 1962:

The plastic material for pinning bottoms, referred to in a past issue of the NEWS, is a polyethylene foam, similar in appearance to styrofoam, but more flexible, and not acted upon by PDB. There must be many outlets where it may be obtained, but one that is known to the Editor is the Poly-Ento Company, Box 3239, San Francisco 19, Calif., U.S.A. This material is not cheap. It is secured to the bottom of the box or try with Poly Kraft Adhesive. It is in current use by the California Academy of Sciences. Two years use show no pin corrosion. It would not be suitable for sending insects through the mails. Prices obtainable from the dealer.

E. A. Froemel of Columbus, Nebraska, writes in saying that collecting has been so bad that he has considered retiring from an interest in collecting, but use of black light has yielded enough good moths to keep up his interest. He speaks of butterfly collecting having been utterly miserable for five years. Maybe other moth collectors can arrange exchanges with Mr. Froemel, and help him out with some desirable material.
