A REMINDER

The Annual Meeting of the Lepidopterists' Society will be held August 25-26 in Santa Barbara at the Natural History Museum as scheduled. The Announcement and Call for Papers which was sent out to all members with the recent issues of the NEWS gives the details. See you there!

FIRE IN THE SANTA BARBARA MUSEUM !

A very damaging fire destroyed many irreplaceable specimens at the Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History on April 12, 1962. The cause seems not to be known. Among the valuable materials lost were the birds intended for the new Bird Hall, also a large collection of shells, many insect specimens, and record cards and books. The science treasures were of the nature to which no true monetary value can be assigned, since many cannot be replaced. One of the largest collections of bird study skins, and a large collection of butterflies were among the losses. According to Dr. V. L. VanderHoof, Director of the Museum, the materials were insured, but this is scant comfort considering the scientific value of the losses.

PLEASE NOTE: We have been assured that this fire will not affect the Annual Meeting of the Society, which will be held as scheduled.

A CORRECTION: Mr. Wm. Edwards of Toronto, Canada, points out that the Central Experiment Farm, from which the butterflies were stolen, is in Ottawa (of course!), not in Toronto, as erroneously stated in Number 4 of the NEWS. He also informs us that the clipping from the Toronto Globe and Mail was dated Feb. 21, 1962. Thanks to Mr. Edwards for bringing this to our attention.

Julian P. Donahue, II6, Sundar Nagar, New Delhi, India, is in India after taking off a year and a half from Michigan State University. He has collected some IO,000 butterflies for Michigan State in about a year, plus a good many thousand moths. He finds 60 to 80 species of butterflies in a day's collecting, and has heard a claim that one man took IO2 different species in one day, in the vicinity of Mussoorie, a Himalayan foothill resort of 5400' elevation. He is working on a list of the butterflies of Delhi.

In 1957, the Bombay Natural History Society published M. A. Wynter-Blythi's <u>Butterflies of the Indian Region</u> (523 pp., 27 colored plus 45 black-and-white plates), which figures and/or describes all Indian butterflies except the high altitude Palaearctic rarities and some rarities from Assam and Burma. Ordering this book directly involves considerable red tape. Mr. Donahue offers to bring a supply of these books with him when he returns in September to the United States. The cost of the book will be less than \$7.00. He would like to hear from members who are interested in this book. The letters should reach him in August to allow time to order the books, so members should write Mr. Donahue as soon as possible.

To members interested in exchange or purchase of Indian Butterflies, he suggests that they wait to contact him until late 1962 or early 1963.

From Julian N. Jumalon, University of San Carlos, Cebu, Philippines, comes a long, newsy letter from which the following is extracted: In March, 1960, The University of San Carlos conferred upon Mr. Jumalon the Master of Science, honoris causa, partly for his work on the Lepidoptera of Cebu and partly for a new type of mosaic art-work using 100% butterfly wings, and he was engaged full time at the University as a Research Worker in Lepidoptera and as a Field Man. Since then he has made several expeditions to Mindanao. He has a grant from the National Science Development Board to study the Papilio idaeoides of Mindanao, and has recently been promoted to Associate Professor. He has submitted some manuscripts for the JOURNAL which should

make interesting reading. He recently completed a successful trip to Southern Davao in search of <u>Chilasia</u>, and will report his results shortly. He congratulate Mr. Jumalon. It was good to hear from him again.



CHECK LIST OF NEARCTIC BUTTERFLIES

By Cyril F. dos Passos

The Lepidopterists' Society Memoir No. 1

The Society is publishing, as its Memoir No. 1 the eagerly-awaited dos Passos Check List, in preparation for many years. The list contains about 3600 names of genera, species, subspecies, forms and synonyms. The Memoir will comprise about 130 pages, including a complete index of all names.

This is the first check list of the Nearctic butterflies to be published since 1938, when the butterfly portion of McDunnough's invaluable list appeared. The new list reflects current views on taxonomic relationships, many radically different from those held in 1938. Hundreds of additional names are included. An important extension over the style of the McDunnough list is the inclusion of publication dates and of parantheses around authors' names where any species or subspecies has been placed in a genus other than the original one.
