# ANNOUNCEMENT OF 1963 ANNUAL MEETING

The 14th Annual Meeting of the Lepidopterists' Society will be held Monday and Tuesday, July 1-2, 1963, in the Town Hall, Wonderland Shopping City, located at the intersection of Fredericksburg Road (U.S. Hwy. 67) and Loop 410, San Antonio, Texas, U.S.A.

Registration will be from 7:30 to 9:00 A.M., July 1, 1963, in the Town Hall. Name tags will be printed in advance for those who will attend. A program embracing many subjects of interest to both amateurs and professionals is in the making. A banquet at Casa Rio on the scenic San Antonio River is planned. Several days of collecting is in the making for those who can stay after the meeting. A display of Texas species is under development. Also, a list of more than 300 species of butterflies found in Texas, together with their distribution over the State will be given to conferees.

You will not want to miss the opportunity to catch some of the rare and exotic species found in Texas. Plan now to join the many other Society members from far and near who will be in San Antonio July 1-2, 1963. We are expecting you.
