Ray Hulbirt retires from Collecting: Ray Hulbirt, for over thirty years a tireless collector and valued correspondent of numerous members, has donated his collection of 18,000 mounted specimen's plus 5,000 papered insects, to Citrus College, Azuza, California, and has retired from active collecting. Mr. Hulbirt was the first Dean of Citrus College, a position he held from 1915 to 1920. From 1920 to 1947 he was Chief Chemist with the American Cyanamide Co. in Azuza. From 1947 through 1962 he devoted his time to collecting extensively. He collected the types of <u>Hesperia hulbirti</u> on Hurricane Hill in the Olympic Mountains. Those who have been fortunate enough to know Ray personally will value him as a genial friend and a fine person. He and his wife now reside in Ashland, Oregon.

Entomology and related sciences have been reorganized at the University of California, Berkeley Campus, into a Department of Entomology and Parasitology (Ray F. Smith, Chairman) with four divisions: Biological Control (P.S. Messenger, Chairman); Entomology and Acarology (R. L. Usinger, Chairman); Invertebrate Pathology (E. A. Steinhaus, Chairman); and Parasitology (D. P. Furman, Chairman). This new department has been formed by the affiliation of the former departments of Biological Control, Entomology and Parasitology, and Insect Pathology.

He has used a portable 15 watt black light tube with a 45 watt converter plugged into his car's cigar lighter. This allows collecting in many areas not otherwise accessible. The light and a muslin sheet are mounted on the hood of the car when in use.
