PERMIT REQUIRED for importation of living stages of Lepidoptera into the United States. The Federal Plant Pest Act of May 23, 1957, prohibits the importation of any living plant pest (including life stages of Lepidoptera) unless authorized by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. No live insects should be shipped into the U. S. unless a federal permit or other Federal authorization has been issued to the U.S. importer to receive the species concerned. Prospective importers should direct requests for the required permit to the Director, Plant Quarantine Division, Agricultural Research Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Federal Center Bldg., Hyattsville, Md., 20782, and include the scientific name of the insects to be imported, their sex, life stage, origin. quanity, method of shipment, intended use, and safeguards to be employed in their handling and disposition at destination to prevent possible pest dissemination. Pupae of only one sex may be imported in one year, --males in even years, females in odd years. More detailed information may be obtained from the above address. Editor's Note, -- This is published to help prevent possible importation of plant pests and to prevent disappointment on the part of importers who might have material confiscated. We hope to publish similar information for Canada in the next issue.

THIS IS WHY many countries, including the United States, prohibit or restrict the entry of fruits, plants, vegetables, seeds, meats and meat products.
