ACTION OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL (by mail canvass, mailed June 25, 1968)

CHANGE IN BY-LAWS. Article 1. Dues.

Section 1. Beginning in 1969, the annual dues for members shall be Eight Dollars, U.S.A. (U.S.A. \$8)

Section 8. Beginning in 1969, the annual dues for student members shall be Five Dollars (U.S.A. \$5). Student membership shall include a subscription to the Journal of the Lepidopterists' Society and the NEWS of the Lepidopterists' Society.

Section 9. Institutional subscription fees shall be Twelve Dollars (U.S.A. \$12). This will include the Journal and the NEWS of the Lepidopterists' Society.

The above change was voted in by unanimous ballot of the Council. It has since been pointed out that it has not been past practice to send the NEWS to Institutional Subscribers. It is the feeling of the Secretary that the intent of the members proposing the above change in Section 9 at the national meetings was primarily to raise the fees, not to change past practices. It may even have been an attempt at conformity in Sections 1, 8 and 9 which led the Secretary to transcribe the verbiage used. At any rate, since the Council voted "yes" to the above change, it is thus recorded.

According to the Constitution, Art. XII, Sec. 2, the by-laws may be altered, amended or repealed by a majority vote of the members voting at any meeting of the Executive Council or by a mail canvass of the Council by the Secretary. All changes so validated must be published in one of the Society's Periodicals.

The reason for changing the dues is mainly increasing the size of the Journal. Editor Powell reports a backlog of papers amounting to more than can be published in 1 1/2 years. He suggested, and the Editorial Board and the members of the 1968 meeting approved, that he issue supplements to the Journal each year for medium size papers (not sufficiently large for the Memoir series). These will be done in the cheaper offset printing method. The Journal will also be increased by eight pages or so per issue, so that the backlog of research may be published. The contemplated increase in dues, particularly institutional subscriptions, will handle this increase.

#### BERKELEY MEETING . . .

The 15th Annual Meeting of the Pacific Slope Section of the Lepidopterists' Society was held at the University of California, Berkeley, September 6 - 8. About 40 members, mostly from California, were registered, some with their families. Others came from Oregon, Washington, Arizona, Kansas, Kentucky and probably other states. There was a very good symposium on population dynamics of butterflies, with discussion centering around Euphydryas editha and Danaus plexippus; several papers on the biology of certain moths; one on the lepidopterous heart; one on a review of the genus Cercyonis; and several on collecting expeditions. The banquet address, by D. Thomas C. Emmel, was on Butterfly Research Today. There was a rewarding field trip to the San Joaquin River Delta, hosted by Mr. Rod Davis, of Antioch, Cal., where Apodemia mormo langei, Ochlodes yuma and Lerodea eufala were collected.
