EVALUATION. There are no known unpaid bills for 1968. The reduction in gross income for 1968 as compared to 1967 is attributed to an early cutoff of business to assure transfer of accounting records to the new Treasurer by 31 December. Expenses were up \$1800 over 1967. This was due to increased printing costs and a sharp increase in postage rates. Of the \$548.70 expended in the conduct of Society business, about 82% was for postage, the remaining \$98 paid for stationery and the printing of dues notices and ballots. With the increased dues and subscription rates, no deficit is anticipated for the business year 1969. A recommended budget for 1969 is: Journal \$7,500, News \$1,500, and Miscellaneous \$500.
