A Card Catalogue of Local Lists

Clench, Dos Passos and Brown are compiling catalogues of local lists of butter-flies for the United States and Canada. It is proposed, if the card file system is used, to continue the project with new cards each six months. The maximum cost to subscribers to the card file would be \$3.00 per hundred entries.
