AN APPEAL

A correspondent and seasonal coordinator is needed for Canada and the Far North and also for the Rocky Mountain Region. The response to requests for committee men has been most gratifying and to all of you who helped: Thanks!

Dr. A. W. Lindsey, noted authority on the Hesperiidae, became Professor-emeritus at Denison University, Granville, Ohio, in June of 1959. He was Curator of the Barnes Collection before coming to Denison in 1922, where he served as Professor and Chairman of Zoology until 1940, and Chairman of Biological Sciences until 1954. He is the author of five textbooks on Evolution, Genetics and Zoology, and the Hesperioidea of North America, by Lindsey, Bell and Williams, is still in print and available.

The Walter C. Stinson collection of Lepidoptera, said to contain 5,700 specimens representing 50% of the butterflies known to occur in Michigan, has been given to the Entomology Museum of Michigan State University, East Lansing, Michigan. Mr. Stinson, who died in May, 1958, had been manager of the International Blue Water Bridge at Port Huron since its opening in 1938.

Steve Hubbell, Tim Newcomb, Tom Pliske and Bob Wyman, of Ann Arbor, are on a collecting trip to Colorado and the Sierra Nevada of California, to obtain specimens for the University of Michigan Museum of Zoology.

J. W. Tilden attended the Institute of Desert Biology at Arizona State University, Tempe, Arizona, from June 21 to August 1, 1959. This is the driest part of the year in Arizona and he found collecting none too good.

Dr. John G. Franclemont and Ronald Hodges are collecting during the Summer in Madera Canyon, Santa Rita Mts., Arizona. They are doing very well on moths, using "black light".

Gerhard Hesselbarth and Hans Schweiger will collect in the French West Alps (San Martin Vesubie), the Eastern Pyranees (Porte) and in Central Spain (Sierra Alta and Bronchales) during July and the first part of August, 1959.

Dr. H. Thomann died in Switzerland at the age of eighty-five, date not known.

3. Garui Doshi Kai (Moth Lovers' Society) (Founded 1951). Journal: Tinea (annual); text in English or in Japanese with English summary; now in Vol. 4. Also publishes G.D.K. News (quarterly) in Japanese; latest issue is No. 12. Has about 160 members, of which 8 also belong to the Lepidopterists' Society. Address: Rikusuishi c/o T. Sugi, 400112, Iriarai, Ota-ku, Tokyo. 4. Hokkaido Rinshimoku Dokokai (Lepidoptera Lovers Club of Hokkaido) (founded 1955), interested primarily in Lepidoptera of Japan. Journal: Coenonympha, issued at intervals, text in Japanese; latest issue is No. 8. Has about 130 members, 3 of which are members of the Lepidopterists' Society. Address: Mr. Ichiro Tateyama, Minami 12, Nishi 17, Sapporo, Hokkaido, Japan. Subscription: ca. US \$1.00; apply directly.

Mr. Iwase tells me also that local insect clubs publishing mimeographed material are numerous in Japan, and that there are other formal entomological societies which, however, rarely carry articles on Lepidoptera.

When writing about the latter, be sure to state the volume and number of the last issue received. Your letter will be answered promptly <u>if</u> a subsequent issue has appeared which you should have received. If you do not receive an answer, there has been a delay in publication, and you will receive your number in due course.
