




The North American Butterfly Association-Xerces Fourth of July Butterfly Counts

1994

The 20th annual NABA-Xerces Fourth of July Butterfly Count, sponsored by the North American Butterfly Association, was held in the summer of 1994. Volunteer participants conducted a one-day census of all butterflies observed at sites within their count area, a 15-mile diameter circle. Most counts were held in late June and July.

In 1994, 249 Fourth of July butterfly counts were held, a 12 percent increase from 1993. The program has doubled since the 124 counts in 1990! The 1994 counts occurred in 45 states (five more than last year) and six Canadian provinces (two more than last year), as well as two states in Mexico. California had the most 1994 counts, with 17, followed by 16 in Wisconsin and 14 in New York. Four counts (Berkeley, CA; Gilpin County, CO; High Line Canal, CO; Lower Pearl River, LA-MS) have been held for all 20 years of the count program. The number of people participating in each count adds up to 2,106 (a 7 percent increase from last year), although some people are tallied more than once, since they participated in two or more counts.

The 1994 count north of Mexico with the highest species diversity was Gilpin County, Colorado, with 103 species. This edged past the previous record of 102 on the Patagonia, Arizona count in 1992. The new Fox River-Seney, Michigan Count tallied 17,191 individuals at an impressive rate of 1,127.3 individuals per party-hour of census effort. This broke the previous record of 16,994 butterflies recorded at the rate of 1,213.9 individuals per party-hour on the Klamath Falls, OR count in 1992.

In 1994, Monarchs produced strong numbers in eastern North America, with heartening increases from strong declines observed in 1992 in the Atlantic coastal states and adjacent Canadian provinces and in 1993 in the Midwest. Monarchs were particularly abundant in the Midwest, where observation rates per party-hour rivalled those in 1991, the previous best year ever for monarchs east of the Rocky Mountains. Monarch rates in the Pacific coastal states were well above the extremely low numbers observed in 1993, but were still well below normal.

1995

The 21st annual NABA-Xerces Fourth of July Butterfly Count will be held this summer. These counts are fun-filled, but also track the butterfly populations of North America. Volunteers select a count area with a 15-mile diameter, and conduct a one-day census of all butterflies sighted within that circle. These counts are usually held in the few weeks before or after the Fourth of July.

The North American Butterfly Association (NABA) organises the counts, and publishes their annual reports. These reports provide important information about the geographical distributions and population sizes of the species counted. Comparisons of the results over the years monitor changes in butterfly populations and reveal effects of weather and habitat change on the different species. In some years the butterfly count shows dramatic changes in butterfly populations, while other years indicate little fluctuation in butterfly numbers. Either way, butterfly counters are always curious about what next year's results will be!

No matter how much or how little butterfly watching you have done, the results of butterfly counting can be surprising and interesting. If a count already exists in your area, please join them for a day of fascinating butterfly counting. You may even participate from your own home, as a garden watcher. If there is no count in your area, you may start your own, as long as you know how to identify the butterflies. Otherwise, inspire a nature center or butterfly club to start one for you!

Lepidopterists' Society, Pacific Slope Section, 41st Annual Meeting, University of California, Berkeley

This meeting replaced an originally scheduled one in Santa Monica, California, which was cancelled because an insufficient number of members registered to attend or present papers. It was organized and hosted by J.A. Powell and others in the Berkeley area. There were 34 registrants, and the attendance was nearly 40.

Friday afternoon's open house at the Essig Museum of Entomology was followed by an informal evening mixer there, after supper. The Essig Museum of Entomology houses half a million pinned specimens, 5,000 vials of larvae, 10,500 genitalia slides, and about 400 primary types of microlepidoptera.

Saturday morning's scientific session consisted of late registration, welcoming remarks and a talk on Biogeography of Lepidoptera on the California Channel Islands by Powell, The Rhopalocera of Santa Cruz Island by R.L. Langston, a video on a collecting trip to Rondonia, Brazil in 1993 narrated by J. Wiseman, and commentary by R.H. Leuschner. The afternoon session included talks on Biology of Euproserpinus (Sphingidae) by K.S. Osborne; The Mystery of Eupithecia suspiciosata (Geometridae) by R.H. Leuschner: Nocturnal moths of the Kern and Pixley National Wildlife Refuges by K.M. Richers; Swallowtails, species, and mitochondrial DNA by F. Sperling; Sun moths (Heliodinidae) and their larval host plant associations by Y.F. Hsu; and The study of Pacific slope Lepidoptera (mainly butterflies), past, present, and future by R.E. Stanford.

A short business meeting followed, where it was agreed that annual meetings should be continued, most of them at a field station or similar place where collecting constitutes a major

activity, and at least half in California, since most attendees live in that state. Kelly Richers offered to host the 1995 Pacific Slope meeting at a camp in the Sierra foothills, Kern County, California, probably the weekend of 24 June, and his offer was readily accepted. Leuschner and Donahue will head up the program committee. A social hour and banquet at Spats Restaurant were the final events of the meeting, where Langston was honored with the Comstock award, and Leuschner was nominated to be the 1995 honoree (Donahue, in absentia, was nominated to prepare the write-up with spicy input from Jeanne Leuschner). The evening closed with the customary doorprize drawing.

Texas Lepidopterists Meet in San Antonio



A Wonderful Lepidopterological Experience: the 9th European Congress of Lepidopterology

The beautiful region of Pálava, in the south of the Czech Republic, was the site of the Ninth European Congress of Lepidopterology from 5 to 9 September 1994. As mentioned in one of the brochures contained in the rich documentation package we received from the organization committee: "Hills and rocks of Pálava, deep forests along the Dyje River, picturesque ponds, vineyards and wine cellars, rural houses and rich chateaux- all of this complements the unique harmony of this corner of Moravia. Thousands of years of human presence modelled this countryside into a masterpiece. Thus its place on the exclusive UNESCO list of biosphere reserves is well deserved". Indeed it was a restful and beautiful place, rich in human and natural history, from evidences of Palaeolithic mass killings below high cliffs, Napoleon's winning strategy at Austerlitz. bunkers of the Second World War, a social organization still strongly influenced by the Communist Era, deep forests, xerothermic vegetation on the hills, etc. All this magnificently told to us by organizers Dalibor Povolny and Karel Spitzer, mostly, for the English versions. For this was a truly international congress of lepidopterists, with approximately 30 countries represented, among which were Japan, China, Indonesia, Georgia, Russia, Ukraine, most European countries, the Baltic Republics, Scandinavia, Canada, and the U.S.A.

The site of the Congress itself was the Faculty of Horticulture, University of Agriculture, Lednice. It was a small but well-equipped university campus comparable to North-American ones, except maybe for the dormitories, somewhat below North American standards. Some complained about the food (not enough!), but we were only a fiveminute walking distance from very decent restaurants in the village, right next to a 17th century castle that belonged to the Liechtenstein family. And how could anyone complain considering that congress fees were only U.S.\$100.00 for five days of boarding, accommodation, registration, documentation and transport by bus to several historic and natural history sites, including a wine cellar for the farewell party, and to Brno, the capital of the region, for the opening ceremony.

So it all began in Brno, where we were welcomed by the Lord Mayor and several other dignitaries in the truly majestic Town Hall. Dalibor Povolny, president of the congress, presented a thirty-minute opening address in Latin (!), which he then summarized more or less briefly in seven other languages. All this while we were sipping a glass of local white wine, offered by the Lord Mayor. We had been told to check the catacombs of a nearby church, which are still filled with peoples' skeletons. However, we were invited to visit the natural history museum instead, which was presenting at the time an exhibit of mechanical dinosaurs!

The various posters and oral presentations of the congress itself were diverse in subjects treated, and mostly very good in quality. The presentations started with a session on systematics and evolution, with the participation of Niels Kristensen

and Malcolm Scoble, among others. For the next day, we had to make the difficult decision of attending either a workshop on Noctuidae, or one on Microlepidoptera. We went to the second, since there lie most of our interests, and were surprised to see the room filled with about 100 people! An impressive number of amateurs of micros, if compared to North America... On the following day, there were sessions on conservation and ecology of Lepidoptera, in which general to very specific topics were treated. Finally, the last day was devoted to zoogeography and regional faunistics. Altogether, 20 posters and 54 oral presentations had been announced. Although one unannounced oral presentation was added to the program, we regretted that eight oral presentations were not presented in the sessions we assisted.

Between and after sessions of workshops and presentations, we had the opportunity to collect in the Pálava Protected Landscape Area, for which all congress participants were issued permits. This area of 73 square kilometers is mostly made of limestone hills covered with various types of vegetation, from impressive mixed forests in the ravines to xerothermic meadows on the hills. Collecting was not fantastic, as it was late in the season, but this area is known to accommodate some 3.087 species of Lepidoptera. Also of interest, mostly after workshops and formal meetings, were the almost continuous discussions at the local restaurants, and, after hours, in rooms at the dorm.

Are you Waiting For the Atlas of North American Lepidoptera?

This series, originally announced by Scientific Publishers in 1990, has had delays and has been transferred to the Association for Tropical Lepidoptera since 1992. Delays for the first part, on Papilionidae, are the result of few subscribers, time for other projects, and for awaiting new names for various subspecies of North American butterflies. We apologize for these lengthy delays to those subscribers that have not received their notices from either publisher. The project will continue, and a general Nearctic butterfly list is due out this year. Future parts now planned will first address the need for an overview "atlas" of all species known, before the

actual species pages are produced, since this will go more quickly and more subscribers may want this in lieu of the more technical species pages. Consequently, the Papilionidae will first appear as part of the introductory "atlas" portion of the series; the cost involved will be similar to what subscribers have paid for but any who do not want this can request refunds or wait for the species pages. RangeMapper 2.2 For Macintosh Computers: A Species Distribution Mapping Program


RangeMapper 2.2 is a Macintosh program for species distribution mapping and similar tasks. It comes with mapping data files for the world (at low resolution) and North America (at higher resolution), and can plot maps in seven projections: north and south polar azimuthal, Mercator, cylindrical, orthographic, stereographic, and Lambert azimuthal equal-area.

World mapping data files contain: Coastlines, major islands, lakes, rivers; national borders, U.S. state & Canadian province borders. The North America mapping data files (which run from Panama and the Caribbean through Greenland, Canada and Alaska, and northeastern Russia) contain the above plus additional islands, lakes, and rivers; and county borders for the lower 48 U.S. states. "Sparse" files are also supplied for state/province borders in Mexico and Central America.

Similar higher-resolution files are available for Australia and New Zealand, and are under development for Europe and South America. You can produce maps of the entire world or any portion thereof, down to a region of the size of the British Isles, from the world files. Using the North America files lets you map down to regions of the order 60 by 40 miles in extent — although in drier parts of the continent, there could be no hydrology shown in such a small region.

Mapping data files derived from the USGS Digital Line Graph files are currently available for Washington, Oregon, Idaho, California, and Alaska north of 64 degrees. These files have far more hydrology, county borders, plus major roads and various administrative borders: National Parks, National Wildlife Refuges, National Forests, etc. Similar files for other states are under development.

When plotting maps, you can decide whether or not to show rivers, or international or state/province borders. You can drop lakes and/or



islands smaller than a user-input diameter. In addition, a "Find-by-name" feature lets you highlight, or map, most hydrologic features in the North America files by name. You may thus produce a map showing only selected major rivers, or highlight on an existing map any river, lake, or island (except for some smaller features).

Features may be mapped in three line widths, and as solid or dotted lines (which can help differentiate between political borders and hydrology).

RangeMapper can read ASCII text files of latitudes and longitudes in either decimal degree or degree/minute/second format, and plot them to maps as various sizes of open or filled squares or circles. If you have large lat/long data files stored in databases or-spreadsheets,

RangeMapper can read data exported as text from standard database/ spreadsheet programs. In addition to plotting data as dots, RangeMapper can plot data as lines (thus plotting migration paths, etc.), or as 3-dimensional bars whose height is controlled by a third variable (thus plotting the geographic variation of quantitative data).

A "verification" feature lets you edit your plotting data files interactively from within the program. A user-designed lat/long grid may be added to any map, and lat/long coordinates may be read from the screen on any map. Maps can be printed directly, or exported as PICT files to be enhanced in a drawing program (such as Canvas or SuperPaint).

Plotting data files are supplied for cities and towns in Alaska, Yukon, Northwest Territories, and Greenland. The UGSG GNIS data file for 123,500 cities and towns in the 48 contiguous states is supplied as well.

RangeMapper is not a GIS. Wildlife surveys are being organized to contribute to biodiversity studies of the flora and fauna of the Greater and Lesser Antilles and neighboring islands. Each survey consists of about a week of field collecting, recording, and photographing. Analysis of the material obtained is done in the following weeks. In Jamaica, reports are made to the Conservation Data Centre, an affiliate of The Nature Conservancy, with regard to rare species sightings and any threats observed to endangered species or their habitats. In Jamaica and other islands, plant communities and selected plant and animal distributions are being plotted, and localities are being recorded with biological information and photographs.

The flora and fauna of Jamaica and neighboring Caribbean Islands have been extensively collected during the last three centuries. A large percentage of this collecting has been scientifically documented, but a significant portion remains unreported or underworked, including the moths. In Jamaica, several new plant records are made each year, on the average, and new butterflies are discovered about once per decade. Extinctions of plants and animals are occurring at a frightening rate, due to clearing of the last remaining areas of primary forest. Fortunately, butterflies seem to be relatively unaffected so far. Surveys are being arranged for small groups of amateurs or professional birders. botanists, entomologists, etc., individual scientists, or larger student groups (preferably accompanied by their professor).

The primary interest has been in sampling and photography of Lepidoptera and their larval food plants, but also included are observation of birds, amphibians, reptiles, and plants, particularly Melastomataceae and Orchidaceae. Emphasis has been on studies of endemic Caribbean genera and their origins with comparative studies of related mainland genera, mostly in Central and South America.

Survey participants enjoy staying in quiet guest houses and secluded hotels. They sample local cooking and a wide variety of native fruits, visit beautiful, uncrowded beaches and remote waterfalls, and admire the birds and other wildlife. 

John Mervyn Plomley (1911-1994)

Mervyn Plomley, of Hollywood, Florida, died October 19, 1994. He was a long-time enthusiast of butterflies and moths, since beginning collecting as a boy. He was born September 5, 1911, in Paris, Ontario, Canada. Following his education in Canada, he studied biology at the University of North Carolina. During World War II he was assigned as a biologist with a hospital in England for 5 years. Mr. Plomley was an expert photographer, especially doing portrait photography for over 30 years in Canada. Later, after moving to the United States, he was in the security business. He married Elizabeth Ann Ferguson and later moved to Florida, settling in Hollywood, Florida in 1957. Besides his interest in photography and Lepidoptera, Mr. Plomley was also an enthusiastic naturalist and orchid grower, which is evident in the well-planted garden in Hollywood he and his wife maintained. He has three daughters, with one living in Florida, one in Mississippi, and one in Ontario, Canada.

Mr. Plomley left a collection of butterflies and moths of almost 8,000 specimens. His collection includes specimens from all over North America, including many rare species and subspecies, particularly from western regions and from Florida. Among the moths, a particular interest was in the Geometridae, and this part of the collection is especially strong in numbers of species, including some specimens he obtained from collectors in Europe and India. His collection and library have been donated to the Florida State Collection of Arthropods, Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, Division of Plant Industry, Gainesville, Florida. Advertisers must provide a copy of the export permit from the country of origin to buyers, for species listed on CITES. Let the buver beware. Only members may place ads, which may run in up to two issues, if requested. The maximum length is 100 words.

The Lepidopterists' Society and the Editors take no responsibility for the integrity and legality of any advertiser. Any disputes arising from such notices must be resolved by the parties involved, outside off the structure of the Society. Aggrieved members may request information from the Secretary regarding steps which s/ he may take in the event of alleged unsatisfactory business transactions. A member may be expelled from the Society, given adequate indication of dishonest activity.

Contact your state department of agriculture and/or PPQAPHUS, Hyattsville, Maryland, regarding USDA or other permits required for transport of live Lepidoptera. Buyers must take the responsibility for being aware that many countries have laws restricting the possession, collection, import, and export of some species.
