MAMMOTH FOSSILS FOUND.

DANSVILLE, N. Y., May 9.—In digging for further remains of the mastodon found on Edward Whiteman's farm, near the village, a second tusk was exhumed, which measured 9 feet 2 inches in length, and 24 inches in circumference, but a considerable portion of it crumbled soon after its exposure to the air. Other discoveries were a part of the lower bone of a leg, part of a rib, a nearly-complete vertebra, and a third tooth. The piece of leg-bone is 35 inches long, 10 inches thick at the upper end, and 9 inches at the lower end, and weighs 28 pounds. The piece of a rib is 38 inches long and 3½ inches wide. The vertebra, apart from its connections, is 4 inches thick. The tooth is smaller than the two found previously, which were each about 7 by 4½ inches, the largest weighing 5 pounds and 3 ounces. It is estimated that the leg-

bones complete measured about 8 feet in length, and that the animal was about 14 feet high. All the remains found up to this time were from three to six feet below the surface, and about eight cubic yards of earth were removed to obtain them. The excavation will be continued on Monday next under the supervision of Dr. F. M. Perine, of Dansville, in whose charge the work and the remains have been placed by Mr. Whiteman.
