My Dear Dr. Marsh

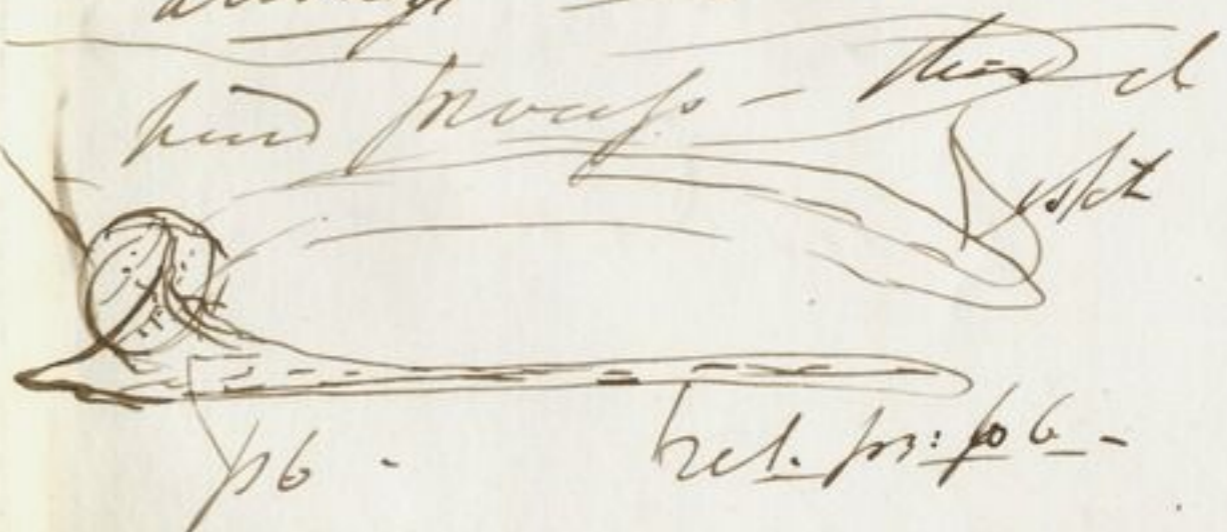
I know of no other
